Area code 315 scam calls are phone calls made by scammers impersonating IRS employees. These calls seem to be made from phone numbers containing 315 area codes, which would place them in New York, but it's unclear if that's where scammers are actually based or they use phone spoofing technology to simply make it look like that's where they are. A common type of phone scam is the IRS scam. In it, scammers imitate Internal Revenue Service (IRS) employees and target individuals, claiming they owe the IRS delayed taxes. Fraudsters then try to convince their targets to transfer them money via a prepaid debit card or bank transfer. One of the more common places used for this scam is north-central New York which has area code 315. That's why this particular scam is often called area code 315 IRS scam and the calls are called area code 315 scam calls. IRS scam calls have been known to appear made from area codes other than 315 as well. Area code 315 IRS scams are usually much more involved than the typical phone scam. Scammers have been known to conduct a significant amount of research into their goals before making the first call so they can sound as believable as possible when they claim to be from the IRS. Fraudsters can claim to know the names of family members, the addresses of the target's home and workplace, and other seemingly private information. According to the IRS, over \$23 million has been stolen from victims with this scam. During the scam call, the scammer will tell you their goal they need to pay an unpaid tax bill as quickly as possible and will suggest specific payment methods such as a prepaid debit card or a money transfer. Both of these payment methods are popular with scammers because they are harder to reverse than a bank transfer or credit card payment. Fraudsters can threaten their target with arrest, deportation, business bans or a revocation of their driver's license. Sometimes, some area code 315 scammers can request their victims mail a copy of their payment receipt to a real IRS office location. This is done to further legitimize scammers and is not a reliable indication that they are real IRS employees at all. Scammers behind the area code 315 IRS scam are likely to find and collect information about their victims through the use of contests on fake websites, sending phishing emails and text messages, and by searching social media networks like Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, and Instagram.
